

Inalienable Human Rights

1. The right to life, liberty, and personal security.
2. Freedom of thought, conscience, belief, religion, and non-belief.
3. Freedom of speech, expression, information, and access to knowledge.
4. Freedom of peaceful assembly, association, and political participation.
5. The right to vote and to stand for public office in the place of one's residence.
6. Equality before the law without discrimination of any kind.
7. The right to food, water, healthcare, shelter, and education sufficient to sustain life and dignity.
8. The right to live free from torture, slavery, forced labor, and arbitrary detention.
9. The right of all people to self-determination through peaceful and democratic means.

These rights are grounded in and expand upon the Universal Declaration of Human Rights **(UNDR)** (1948), which is hereby affirmed as the minimum standard for all planetary governance.
