

Principles of the Peace, Freedom, Justice, and Fairness (PFJF) Movement

1. The Equal Value of Human Life

Every human life is equal, sacred, and beyond monetary value. No person is more or less valuable because of nationality, race, religion, gender, identity, wealth, or belief.

2. Nonviolence

We believe that peace and nonviolence are the highest principles of political and social action. War, genocide, terrorism, torture, and cruelty should be eliminated wherever possible.

3. Human Rights for All

Every person is entitled to the full protection of universal human rights, including freedom of speech, belief, expression, conscience, information, association, and equal treatment under the law.

4. Democratic Self-Governance

Governments derive legitimacy from the consent of the governed. Free, fair, transparent, and accountable elections are essential at every level of government.

5. Equality Under the Law

All people should be treated equally under the law. No individual, corporation, organization, or government should be above the law.

6. Opposition to Corruption

Political corruption undermines freedom, justice, and public trust. We support transparency, accountability, and democratic reforms to reduce corruption in all institutions.

7. Freedom of Thought and Belief

Every person has the right to practice any religion, philosophy, spiritual path, cultural identity, or no belief system at all without coercion or persecution.

8. Protection of Minorities and Human Diversity

A just society protects the rights, dignity, and equality of minorities, women, LGBTQ+ individuals, disabled persons, indigenous peoples, and all historically marginalized groups.

9. Truth, Science, and Open Inquiry

We value truth, reason, scientific inquiry, education, and the open exchange of ideas. Knowledge should be accessible to all humanity.

10. Stewardship of the Planet

Humanity has a responsibility to protect the environment, natural resources, biodiversity, and the long-term habitability of our planet for future generations.

11. Peaceful International Cooperation

Global problems require peaceful cooperation among peoples and nations. International institutions should promote human rights, conflict prevention, accountability, and fairness.

12. Voluntary Participation

The PFJF Movement is voluntary, open, inclusive, and non-dogmatic. Anyone who shares any of these goals and principles is welcome to participate.
